Letter from Pastor Jason Wolter, MN North District Life Coordinator, St Marks, Benson MN

This is an urgent message from your representative to the LCMS MN Public Policy Committee (which discusses the various issues related to Life; Marriage, Family and Sexuality; Religious Liberty; and Parental Choice). As the Life Coordinator for the LCMS- Minnesota North District, there are times when I feel compelled to address you about certain things that are- or will have- a tremendous impact on your ministries. The reason for this message is that there are some VERY disturbing things going on in the Minnesota legislature. As you probably know, there is one party rule going on in Minnesota. Going back to 1992 (the last year for which I could find data) there has never been control by the conservative side of government. On the other hand, there have been four times when the other side has had full control of the Minnesota government. That has been the case for the past two years. Normally, I would keep my nose out of political matters. But I can hold my tongue no longer. Our state has done, and continues to do, all kinds of things that will have an impact on our ability to serve our members. To keep it organized, I'll post these things by the four areas I listed above.

First, let's take a look at Life Issues. In no particular order, you should know that a new Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) is on the docket again. But it's not your parent's ERA! In addition to protecting women's rights in the workplace, it will also protect the "rights" of LGBTQ+ (Lesbian, Gay, Bi-Sexual, Transgender, Queer, plus all other "genders") community. Here is the actual amendment: 2024 PROPOSED Robust ERA Language for SF37: All persons shall be quaranteed equal rights under the laws of this state. The state shall not discriminate against any person in intent or effect on account of race, color, national origin, ancestry, disability, or sex, including but not limited to pregnancy, pregnancy outcomes and reproductive freedom, gender identity, gender expression, or sexual orientation. As you can see, the underlined parts are problematic for us (who believe that the Bible is our source- and guide- for what we believe and proclaim). And the most dangerous part of all is that there won't be any exemptions carved out for ministers. If this passes (which it probably will), we (as ministers of the Gospel) will be under the same rules and regulations as everyone else. And this was intentional. The leaders of the committee made that clear. They think that conservative Christians are using "hate speech" when they preach against these things. And they refuse to let that happen. In another disturbing case, SF 3967 and HF 4053 propose to make ALL insurance companies cover the cost of an abortion. That's because they consider abortion to be another example of "women's health". In last year's legislative session, Minnesota became a "sanctuary state". In other words, women were allowed to kill their unborn children at any point, up to (and past) the child's birth. The MN Appeals Court refused to hear a Mothers Offering Maternal Support (MOMS) attempt to defend a number of pro-abortion laws that we enacted in 2022. Those laws included the requirement that abortion providers notify parents before performing an abortion on a minor. Now, it won't be necessary for any parents to be notified about their child's decision to kill her unborn child. The reason that the court refused to hear their case was because they trusted the MN Attorney General (Keith Ellison) to advocate on their behalf... like he said he would. But after the deadlines passed, Mr. Ellison refused to take up the case. In simple terms, he let the laws go into effect without any opposition.

The next area of concern is related to Marriage, Family and Sexuality. A proposed change (HF 4021) to the Minnesota Human Rights Act (at which the LCMS was represented by Rev. Fred Hinz) would carve out an exemption for religious associates, religious corporations, religious societies or any other entity organized for the education of children. If not passed, it would force everyone in the state (including ministers) to go along with the views of the current government, regarding the rights and privileges of the LGBTQ+. In other words, it would grant all ministers the right to exercise their First Amendment issues. But the chair of that committee was very clear: the exclusion of those religious entities was intentional. The amendment was voted down on party lines. Watch it for yourself, starting at the 13:00 mark: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=IoIdyAvohmg As Rep. Niska said, "The masks have come off".

HF 3386 would provide an additional \$1,000,000 for the act of "kidnapping" children who cross into Minnesota and want to transition to another gender. I call it "kidnapping" because our state already assumes temporary parental control over that child and refuses to send them back to their state of origin until the transition has taken place. In other words, it's another assault on parental rights. Another House File (HF) is supposed to be coming down the pike (it doesn't yet have a number assigned to it), which would grant a \$400,000 to schools to teach "Before Racism", in order to prevent racism in children aged 1-5. HF 174 / SF 662 is a proposed change that would allow non-teachers to teach classes on Comprehensive Sex Education. You can look that up on your own. What I want you to know is that those "non-teachers" would be using material that was developed by Planned Parenthood... and taught by members of that organization. HF 2280 / SF 2236 would Promote Gender Affirming Care for minors. It would guarantee that the right of every child-regardless of their age- to make decisions about their gender... WITHOUT any kind of parental notice or input. Perhaps the most concerning issue of all, is the presidential redefining of Title IX. That was the national law, passed in 1972, which, "prohibits sex-based discrimination in any school or any other education program that receives funding from the federal government." Soon, President Biden will alter that law to prohibit discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation, sexual identity and gender expression. In reality, it will force all schools- including private, Christian schools to force compliance with students' preferred pronouns, mandate that biological males be allowed to compete in women's sports, encourage children to change their gender without the knowledge of their parents, and allow biological boys into girl's locker rooms. This will be a big win for LGBTQ+ groups. I don't know if this will go to the Supreme Court or not; but if it is allowed to pass into law, that will be a huge issue for our schools.

On matters of **Religious Liberty**, I've already written about the removal of religious exemptions from the Minnesota Human Rights Act. But there is one other issue that needs to be mentioned. As Supreme Court Justice Alito warned, back when the Obergefell ruling was made the law of the land, **now it is legal for Christians (at least those who hold the Biblical view of marriage) to be excluded from serving on juries. I suppose some folks will see that as a good thing (hopefully not!), but what it means, in effect, is that conservative Christians are being even further marginalized. I don't know how this will turn out if it is brought to the Supreme court, or even if will make it that far. But it is a concerning development!**

When it comes to **Parental Choice**, there is only one troubling matter. In addition to the recently mandated "Ethnic Studies" curriculum (which was made law last legislative session for all public schools), now <u>all</u> licensed teachers in Minnesota will be **required to teach the new Minnesota Social Studies Standards**. These Standards ensure that all kinds of "woke" ideology will make its way into all schools.

By now you might be wondering **what we can do** about these things. Well, for **one thing**, you can share them with your congregations. I don't know if it would be appropriate to talk about them from the pulpit (other than the obvious sinfulness of some of these groups); but it would be great to talk about them after church, in Bible study, an LLL or LWML convention (which some churches are doing) or any other gathering of saints. I have to believe that more people would be opposed to these things- if only they knew they were going on. You are the ones who can educate them about all these things. **Secondly**, you (and members of your congregations) can write to your legislative leaders and make them aware of your opposition to these things. Most of these things are still in the proposal stage. There is still time to do something about them! **Thirdly**, if (or when) a 2024 Voter's Guide is provided, PLEASE make sure that your members are aware of it... and use it to help guide their voting decisions. **Finally** (and most important of all): PRAY! We may not have the ability to change the hearts of our legislators; but God does. I don't know if He will or not; but we are encouraged in Scripture to pray constantly. If there is anything that troubles us, let us bring it to the Lord in prayer. May God have mercy on all of us as we attempt to chart these uncharted waters.

From the Director's Desk



As spring arrives and the days grow longer, summer camp excitement builds at Lutheran Island Camp. This summer, we are looking forward to learning more about Christ, through whom and for whom all things were created (1 Corinthians 8:6), by focusing on the "I am" statements Jesus made about himself. It is precisely

INDONESIAN HYMNAL UPDATE

It has been a while since I have provided an update here about the Indonesian Lutheran Hymnal. The final proof read of the Hymnal is scheduled to be completed by March 31st. We should finish within a day or so of that deadline. Deaconess Sandra Rhein is working on the agonizingly tedious process of gathering all the metadata for the hymns and liturgies. It seems like an inordinate amount of work goes into all those little words at the bottom of every page, the index, and copyright acknowledgements. However, all those little words are invaluable to those who know how to use them!



Our goal, as of today, is to have the Hymnal ready to print by July and a dedication ceremony in November, which would coincide with Deaconess Sandra's travels and a second visit from LCMS Church Relations.

Pastor Wood and Pastor Aruan work together on editing hymn translations. There will be over 40 new hymn translations available in the Indonesian Lutheran Hymnal.

Pre-Field Missionary Life

Flying and Such

As Pre-field missionaries (missionaries who have not yet been deployed overseas) our main goals are: 1. to get the training we need and 2. to build relationships with prayer and financial partners.

January was a month full of training for both Nathan and Sarah. Nathan worked to get as many flights in as possible prior to leaving for the Midwest. He continues to hone his skills on airwork, take-offs, and landings, in order to be prepared to fly overseas where there will be less room for error because of the terrain and airstrips he will be navigating. He has also been doing some flight scheduling for JAARS. This means he gets to keep track of the flights that have been planned and makes sure the schedule is in order for the day.

As Nathan was continuing to fill his weeks at aviation, Sarah was learning all about translation programs. She spent January playing catch-up on a translation course for LBT partners that had started back in September. This course involved reading a document written by LBT employees and discussing the various things to take into consideration when planning a translation project. Sarah learned much and enjoyed growing in her knowledge of translation.

Staying in the Ruts

In January, Nathan and Sarah were also able to attend a manual transmission and four-wheel drive safety course at JAARS which will help us to prepare for situations that we may encounter overseas. The course involved learning to drive manual (which Sarah had never learned before) and 4-wheel drive safety. There was a classroom portion covering the ins-and-outs of manual transmission and 4-wheel drive vehicles, as well as general vehicle maintenance. This was followed by a hands-on portion of the course seen in the pictures below.



We learned how to use a high-lift jack, repair a tire, and use a winch. Here we are winching a car back upright.



These are the muddy ruts on the 4-wheel course. Our instructor's advice: stay in the ruts to keep going forward, don't fight them, you will only slide back in.



We took turns signaling to each other to get down this rocky path without damaging the tires or undercarriage.

Travels

Since late January we have been even busier than we were before because we have been traveling. Every Sunday, and often during the week, we have been visiting churches, meeting with congregations, and speaking at Bible studies and women's groups.

So far, we have visited 6 congregations for their weekend services and Sunday school time, and 5 small groups in Iowa, Wisconsin, Illinois, and Minnesota. Before Holy Week we will be visiting churches and individuals in Indiana. After Easter we will be back in Iowa before heading to Michigan to connect with churches there.

We have really enjoyed connecting with many individuals already and look forward to meeting many more in the upcoming weeks! God has led us to so many encouraging and supportive prayer and financial partners. We praise Him for the connections that we have made!

We will continue to visit churches throughout the Midwest until May. If you are interested in meeting with us during the middle of the week, please contact us to see if we might be able to visit with you, your small group, or congregation.



We had the privilege of speaking at the church we worshipped at while attending college. Nathan's sister, Rachel, was able to join us for that service!

Our family cannot be deployed overseas until we are fully funded. We especially need recurring financial support. We also have the expense of Nathan's JAARS training.
