BASEMENT BATHROOM REMODEL

ACT BRUNCH AND SILENT AUCTION

EASTER VIGIL

Our Saturday Service on the night before Easter is special. It begins in low light, reminding us of the darkness of Good Friday. Candles are lit throughout the congregation, reminding us of the hope of Easter. The lights remain somewhat dimmed as we hear the Word and as we renew our baptismal vows. The lights increase as we celebrate communion. The bell rings as we conclude the service hearing the Easter Gospel for the first time this season. Join us for this special service.

EASTER CELEBRATION

On Easter morning we will gather at 7 AM to celebrate our Lord's Resurrection as soon as possible. Our youth will help to lead us in worship that day. At 9 AM we will gather to celebrate our Lord's triumph over death and the grave in a service of Easter Gospel and Holy Communion. The joy of Easter is so great and each service is unique, so it is worth coming to both! Our youth will serve a light breakfast in between services.

Dear Friends, Greetings from Mzuzu in the name of our suffering Lord and savior Jesus Christ, I would like to sincerely apologies for the delay to send a detailed report on how wine to water filters were distributed to both our members -CLCMS and non-members.it has been a great honor to come to you with cheeks of smiles from the members who received as the reports indicates that those wine to water filters are changing their mindset, focusing to clean water being used in their families. We say thank you so much for such an awesome gift of love.

Areas where these filters were distributed;

Malawi is divided into four regions, Northern, southern, eastern and central regions. Our churches are in all these regions. In most areas of the country of Malawi, clean water is a problem. During summer season too much water is consumed, at this time thirst is meeting everyone, leading to drink any water available due most areas springs of water are dried. So, there is no any other option hence drinking any water available.

Now, with the coming of wine to water filters, members are helped with clean water now.

Some few challenges; these wine to water filters some say that after using them, when they clean, at times they do not block and no water filtering and I received this complaint from two people who received but it might be they did not follow the instructions. Another challenge was the shortage of buckets, with the help from LCMS grant we managed to buy over 136 buckets and we have distributed over 241 wine to water filters, 105 had been distributed without buckets and were told to buy their own plastic buckets and job is having trained them, those who have bought buckets is to make a hole and advise them how to use. Right now I am remaining with 50 wine to water which came late and will be distributed to those who are critically in need regardless of religion but have a need.



This is in Karonga, northern region, it in the heart of a town but access to clean water is zero, and many times, this part of the area if flooded almost every year and cholera outbreaks become the order of the day. I did share them but still asks for many to at least have such wine to water filters, 23 of them benefited, the area is accommodating over 500 people. It is 600m to our CLCMS church building.



This is Chinsewe a preaching place from our church, it is almost 10 km from our church, Karonga town, the area plain and flat, usually faces floods every year. No clean water is found and the place warm

above 43 degrees Celsius during summer, I distributed to 12 members but still there is a great need to meet some vulnerable needy people for at least to save their lives.

This is **Mbeta in the lower Shire**, **Nsanje** close to border between Malawi and Mozambique southern region of Malawi. There is much need of the filters I distributed 16 wine to water filters plus buckets, those who had received, say the filters have made their life better as those who use them testify.





This is St. Mary Magdalene CLCMS in Mzimba district, Northern region of **Malawi 23 wine to water filters** were distributed. we still need some because the area is crowded and there no clean water except one borehole which to some, there is a distance. Those who use them say, the filtered water is good and they enjoy it



This is in Mzuzu the regional headquarters of Northern region, a city with over 2 million people, with few accesses to clean water and most times swampy spring water are used, to those who had chance, received the wine to water but were told to buy buckets and those who bought, I did instruct them how to use.

This is in Makanjira CLCMS a church close to the border between Malawi and Mozambique. It is in the district /county of Mangochi in the eastern region of Malawi the area if a place where people were exiled from southern region seeking cultivation. There are no ware wells except one which accommodates thousands of people drinking from, the challenge is that there is no sanitation to it. So, when I distributed 12 of them, it was discovered that there is a great need as the area has almost **7,000 people.**



This is Mgona CLCMS down to the lower shire in Nsanje district a disasterprone area. **23 wines to water** filters were distributed to members and later 20 filter minus buckets, and were told to buy their own plastic buckets and having done so, I will go and instruct them how to use it. Buckets can be easily sourced to some but not to all like the elderly.

This is at my church in Mzuzu, Holy Trinity confessional Lutheran church -CLCMS some needy members 19 of them received and are using them. Reports say that they are of great meaning as regards to health issues.

Last Sunday I went to visit our brothers and sister in Dowa County where **Democratic Republic of Congo -DRC** refugees are kept. We about **60 members** there and I took **20 of the wine filters** and trained them how to use and they too were told to buy buckets so they begin to use this wine to water filters. This is the most congested area where every year, there is an outbreak of cholera and other related diseases due to bad water. So the use of these wine to water filters can go a long way assisting them, the camp has almost **13,000 refugees**,












All 8 pastors, 14 evangelists, 10 leaders of the churches have received filters.

Expanding Horizons

I couldn't help but rejoice greatly over how things turned out. "How good and pleasant it is . . . " according to Ps. 133:1!!

In early February, I took an exploratory trip north of Tokyo to become acquainted with the third of the three Japanese pastors serving the small confessional Lutheran Ev. Christian Church entity here in Japan.

Pastor Nidaira serves two congregations in Tochigi Prefecture, one in Ashikaga, the other in Utsunomia.

What a blessing to find a well-crafted sermon proclaiming Christ as Savior, clear distinctions of Law and Gospel, the traditional Japanese Lutheran liturgy, and solid catechesis following worship! At the same time, what a great need for prayer that God would bless the faithful ministry of His Word and Sacraments in such a resistant culture!

For those visiting Japan, the land and culture appears to be steeped in religion with shrines, temples, and sculptured images around every corner, in back yards, in the households, and along the country paths.

Paradoxically however, most Japanese consider themselves nonreligious and simply follow societal "customs" without any obligations of specific doctrines or membership.

Their "religious viewpoint" of life along with their customs seem to lie on a moveable point somewhere between the religious and the non-religious depending on circumstance and perspective: sometimes as "Japanese spirituality", sometimes as superstitious folkways, sometimes as traditional customs, festivals, or holidays with religious origins but tenuous religious weight.

What functions as a glass barrier is that Japanese-ness seems embedded, in part, in its distinction against the "foreign" Christian faith.

At almost every funeral, ritual reverence for and communication with one's ancestors beyond the grave endures as the pervasive, religious substratum of the culture.

This is a major challenge for the proclamation of new life in Christ who was crucified for our trespasses and raised for our justification.

Growing Ministry

In addition to occasional visitors, we are very pleased to welcome those staying in Japan for longer periods of time who often come from some distance in order to gather at our Shinjuku Tokyo worship site. Recently Cacey and Moeko Barnett (from the north), Matthew Hetland (from the south), and the Terjesen family from the Yokosuka military base, all found their way to us.

In January, we received news that a new LCMS military chaplain, Rev. Ryan Schnake, has begun serving in Okinawa Japan through the LCMS Ministry to the Armed Forces. We are glad to entrust into his capable hands the work we have carried on there through our occasional visits these past two-and-a-half years.

At our current host congregation, I am particularly delighted that those who use only Japanese have a confessional, liturgical service available in the morning service with Pastor Yoshimura. Those who use only English have a confessional, liturgical service available in our twice-amonth Sunday afternoon service under my care. And those who are bilingual—

or who have invited someone to worship of either category—can worship at either service or at both depending on their preference. For example, on some occasions in the afternoon, everyone is either comfortably bilingual, or struggling to a greater or lesser degree with the English liturgy and sermon. So, for catechesis after the service we switched to Japanese for the greater comfort and understanding of those who were struggling. It reminds me that in heaven there will be those of many nations and languages all worshipping at the throne of Christ. •
